### **Antoin Akpom Achievements Foundation**

2020 started off with a promising projection plan, workshops, projects and events. We pre-booked venues for our Intervention & prevention workshops put things in place for external organization to support the participants in various areas (Radio Broadcast training, Well-Being, Employability Skills & Coding & Robotics).

Suddenly we were faced with a worldwide epidemic. We went into lockdown and with all good intentions all our plans came to a standstill. Initially panic mode set in, uncertainty and confusion as this was an unprecedented situation in which we found ourselves in. Everything ceased for a couple of weeks whilst we deliberated as to what step to take next. As a charity providing a physical classroom-based workshops to our young people it became very challenging. We had to re-evaluate how we could best continue delivering a quality service using other methods.

It meant re-designing our modules and methods of delivery, re-train members of the organization. Learn how to use various digital platforms.

Zoom meetings were set up with our affiliated organisations sharing ideas, experiences and map out a mechanism on how to cope with these major changes.
